## Open Access content

"Open Access" means the free online availability of articles and other scholarly research output so that anyone can see and use them. There are two ways to provide Open Access - by publishing in a journal that makes information available online, free at the point of use (sometimes these charge a publication fee though many do not) or by depositing information such as copies of articles published in non-Open Access journals in an Open Access repository. Many institutions have these now, and there are also some centralised, subject-based ones too. The questions in this section are co-sponsored by the Joint Information Systems Committee (JISC).
